 Raising attainment in primary school swimming Profile of PE in the school has continued to be raised with PE celebrated and enjoyed across the school, for example pupil's individual successes in their sports taken outside of school, dance competitions, introduction of street dance sessions. Improved and increased opportunities for pupils to engage with physical activities during the school day and after school (structured lunchtime clubs, extra curricular activities, outdoor gym area, 15 minute Fitness) Opportunities to participate in inter school competition have been increased both within PE lessons and within extracurricular activities (Rock Challenge winners 2019, dance events, cross country/running events) 	 Due to number of RQTs and Teach First participants, there is a need to up-skill and train existing staff. Needs to be identified by skills audit and then addressed through training courses and in school CPD. Continue to provide further extra-curricular activities and a greater range of curricular sporting activities – external agencies/sports coach to be sourced to broaden children's horizons. Purchase new equipment – In order to offer a broader range of activities, further resources need to be purchased.
